Almeda Harris, our modern-day founder, revived Kitsap Humane Society with a location on Charleston Beach Road in Bremerton.

During World War II, the population of Kitsap County, particularly in Bremerton, increased dramatically due to the war industries located there. This led to an increase in the pet population as well. Unfortunately, pets were often abandoned when their owners relocated. While some volunteer rescue efforts were made, many pets were euthanized by local officials.

1971

After construction in the late 1960s, the Charleston Beach shelter was enlarged. By the mid-eighties, the needs of the animals and our community surpassed the capabilities of this location.

1989

Thanks to Almeda's incredible work and the developing support and trust of the community, KHS grew, and in the late 80s, construction was completed on our current Dickey Road campus in Silverdale.

Throughout the decades, volunteers have been critical to KHS's success. In the spring of 1990, new dog walking trails were marked, cleared, and created thanks to the effort of Boy Scout Troop 1502. Additionally, volunteers created the original dog walking system and built miniature "outhouses" that dotted the trails, making it easier for dog walkers to clean up after dogs.

1990

K9 College was created! KHS's first foray into behavior and training offered basic training skills to shelter dogs thanks to a \$10,850 grant from PetSmart Charities.

2003

Kitsap Animal Control began an era of redevelopment, focused on connecting, engaging, and being a resource for people and pets in need, keeping them together whenever possible.

Our low-cost spay/neuter services were launched thanks to a lost \$10,000 bet paid by former Seattle Mariners player Jeff Cirillo! The first such operation was the spaying of a kitten

On the heels of the Great Recession and a challenging time for KHS, the shelter welcomed Eric Stevens as Executive Director, who was able to position KHS as a financially stable and healthy organization.





The longstanding need to improve sheltering for animals was achieved with a new, 9,500-square-foot Pet Adoption Center opening in October.

2019

Lee Harper joined KHS as our Executive Director, shepherding a new era of animal welfare on the heels of COVID, focused on keeping people and pets together whenever possible.

2021

2022

With a record-breaking 600 active volunteers and fosters, as well as 60plus staff members, KHS starts construction on the Russ & Linda Young Veterinary Lifesaving Center, which will include a low-cost community clinic, scheduled to open in Fall 2023.

2014

KHS launched its Rescue Me transfer program, which transports at-risk animals to Kitsap County from high-volume shelters around the country, saving 1,221 animals in need in its first year.

2020

KHS renovated part of our old shelter building to include the Heidi Harnett-Wakefield Memorial Behavior & Training Center, honoring a long-standing volunteer at KHS. The center is dedicated to providing enhanced care and enrichment to dogs in our shelter.

After pausing our Kickin' It with K9s program, launched in 2019, which gives shelter dogs an offsite break, the Foster Department took over sleepovers and shortterm shelter breaks for dogs, hosting our first month-long Pawjama Party! Over 20 dogs spent time in foster in the month of June.

THE FUTURE

2022 was an exciting year for making progress and creating a stronger safety net for people and pets! KHS continues to lead the way in animal welfare, maintaining one of the highest "save rates" among shelters across the United States. Our shelter was even voted "the best place to adopt a furry friend in Western Washington" last November.

Thanks to the support of so many, in September 2022, we broke ground on the Russ & Linda Young Veterinary Lifesaving Center (VLC). And now, KHS is less than 10 months away from opening this game-changing facility.

Most recently, after the snow was melted – the concrete slab foundation was poured, walls were erected, and framing began! The excitement is tangible! The VLC will provide critically needed medical care to tens of thousands of pets and allow KHS to support thousands of families who are low-income in the years ahead.

Remarkably, in just 24 months, KHS has raised more than \$8.8M of our \$9.8M project expense, leaving the shelter just under a million dollars to raise to fully fund the project.

Access to Veterinary Care

From the Desk of Dr. Jen Stonequist

Last October, our Director of Shelter Medicine, Dr. Jen Stonequist, and our Veterinary Operations Manager, Jean Gibowski, traveled to Minneapolis for the ASCPA Access to Veterinary Care Conference.

Dr. Jen shared their experience, "Jean and I are so grateful to have had the opportunity to participate in a groundbreaking national conference recently. The conference was the first of its kind

- a unique and timely opportunity for organizations working towards making vet care more accessible to families in need, a subject that is, of course, near and dear to our hearts! With the construction of the VLC, including our community clinic, underway and our pilot program for increasing access to vet care for pet owners in need already up and running on a small scale, it couldn't have been better timing!

It was wonderful to be surrounded by so many like-minded individuals from all across the country. You might say Jean and I definitely found our people! We also quickly learned that while there were lots of organizations there ready to ask the question, 'how can we help?' there were only a handful of organizations who had actually taken the plunge and had started doing this lifesaving work - KHS among them.

Realizing that KHS is positioned at the forefront of a national movement that will hopefully soon be sweeping the country and saving lives was pretty neat! In the end, KHS is excited to be a part of the greater national access to veterinary care family. We came away not only with a revitalized commitment to serving our own community but also a resolve to create a successful model that other organizations across the country can learn from and build off of. We know that there is a lot of work to do - we also know we are not alone. We're so very grateful for our community here in Kitsap; we truly have something special. We know that you are behind us in making this important lifesaving work a reality; we can't wait to see where it takes us!"

nce known as "Posing Pets with Santa" in the 80s, Kitsap Humane Society's "Santa Paws," is celebrating 32 years with one very jolly fellow. While we know him as Santa Jeff, Jeff Berger has been volunteering at KHS over the years not only as St. Nick but in a variety of roles including being a lead in the cattery for the past 10 years. His remarkable dedication and overflowing spirit has made all the difference over the course of the past 3 decades.

When Santa Jeff and his wife moved to Kitsap
County in the 90's, Jeff happened across
an ad asking for volunteer Santa's at
KHS's holiday event, "I thought a
Santa for pets sounded interesting.
So, I volunteered," he said. "At
that time, there were a few of
us Santas because there were
4-5 locations and multiple
shifts to cover. With a bit of
instruction from KHS dog
handlers and less interest

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from other Santas, I eventually became the only KHS Santa. And I ran with it because I love it! You don't do it for 30 years and NOT love it!"

Over the years, Santa Jeff has been visited by dogs, cats, one horse, a few llamas, snakes, rabbits, ferrets, a potbellied pig, a KuneKune pig, hedgehogs, a tarantula, a blue tongued skink, bearded dragons, tropical birds, and guinea pigs!

"One of my favorite stories is of a woman who brought her Irish Setter for photos with me" said Jeff. "She told me the dog loved butter and asked if it would be okay if she smeared a little butter on my cheek so the dog would "kiss" me for the photo. We did this for 10 years and she became "The Butter Lady" before moving out of the county."

In all of his time at KHS, the biggest change Jeff has seen is, "going from a very small, intimate shelter to a much larger and busier organization. I have to spread myself a little thinner to get to know all the new faces at KHS, but I'm working on it! I want to take the opportunity

to especially recognize and thank "the front lines" staff and all my fellow volunteers. You all rock!"

MEET OUR MODERN-DAY FOUNDER: ALMEDA HARRIS WILSON

ooking back through history, we're awed by the strength and courage it must have taken one Almeda Harris Wilson to

become the modern-day founder of Kitsap Humane Society.

Born on a homestead in Silver Creek, Washington, on January 6, 1914, she was the youngest of five siblings. After graduating high school and then college with an associate degree in business, Almeda moved to Kitsap County in 1940.

While KHS was initially founded in 1908, efforts waned over time until the shelter was virtually non-existent. After a huge explosion in the stray pet population following World War II, Almeda knew she had to do something. Stray pets roamed the streets and often met tragic and inhumane ends.

Her first effort in the mid-50s was a bust. But after an incident in 1961 where a stray dog found by her neighbor was shot by police, Almeda was determined to bring KHS roaring back.

A strong character – and a woman who spoke her mind in the 60s – she was described in one Bremerton Sun article as rather polarizing, "either you loved her or you hated her" – but no matter how anyone felt about Almeda, her efforts to save abandoned and injured animals, reunite lost pets with their families, and ensure a safe haven for lost and stray pets must be commended, especially in the era she operated in.

Almeda, along with three men, were the first employees of KHS. However, they quickly left as she wrote, "They didn't want to work for no damn woman." She was undeterred. After that, many of the following KHS employees were off-duty police officers and first responders in the Kitsap community.

Almeda was horrified by the conditions that shelter animals were kept in at some of the other shelters she visited and was adamant that dogs needed outdoor runs, the ability to relieve themselves, and staff or volunteers to walk them. At the time, stray dogs brought into shelters were often left to sit in their own waste for hours and days at a time.

Over the following 20 years, her work at the shelter's original Charleston Beach location to improve the quality of conditions for shelter pets led to a big move to the present-day shelter location on Dickey Road.

Even after retiring from KHS in 1974, Almeda remained heavily involved with shelter in the decades to come. In 2013, at the age of 99, Almeda attended the dedication ceremony for the shelter's then-new cattery, named in her honor, as well as William Mahan's, one of the shelter's original Board Members.

Then in 2014, Almeda made a generous donation to the shelter, allowing KHS to purchase a transfer van for the newly launched Rescue Me program, as well as a new Animal Control vehicle and the shelter's first-ever x-ray machine, allowing vet staff to provide more in-depth care. Both vehicles and the x-ray machine are still used to this day.

At 101 years old, Almeda passed away on September 5, 2015. Even in her passing, Almeda still advocated for KHS, asking for any donations made in her honor to be given to the shelter. That same year, then-Executive Director Eric Stevens shared, "No single person has done more for animal welfare in Kitsap County than Almeda Harris Wilson."

Today, we celebrate serving as more than a shelter due to the many efforts and

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deep dedication of one woman to improve the lives of animals in need in our community.
Thank you, Almeda.
