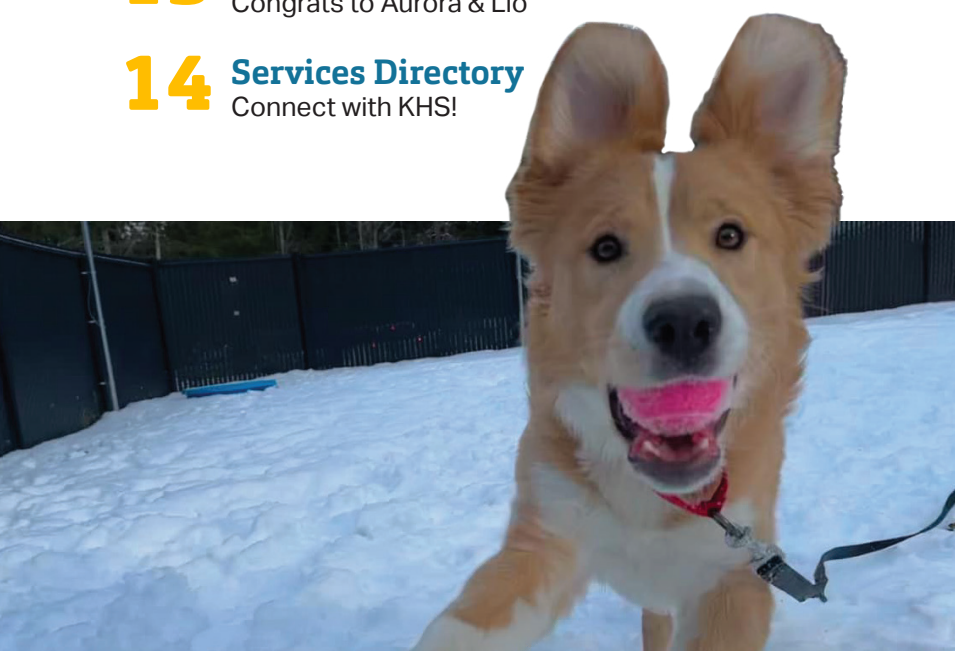

A Letter from Dr. Jen & Jamie



People are always amazed at the breadth of what we do. It's not just adoptions. It's not just Animal Control. It's not just veterinary care. Kitsap Humane Society covers the whole swath of what animal welfare entails, from the first moment an animal comes through our door until the moment they find their new home – and often even past that.

But it wasn't always this way. It wasn't that long ago that we were a one-building operation, with extremely limited capabilities. In fact, it was as recent as 2018 when we began to really tackle all of the animal welfare issues that faced Kitsap and started to take the shape of the community safety net that we've since become.

Picture this: Cat kennel after cat kennel, lining every hallway and stacked to the ceiling; dogs leashed to the wall as kennels were being cleaned – just far enough from each other to avert a kerfuffle; veterinarians and vet techs working elbow to elbow in cramped quarters; medicines being distributed out of a repurposed closet, never enough to cover our needs; and anxious barks filling every space.

The work was immense and never ending. We didn't have the kind of equipment we have now. We didn't have a fully staffed behavior and enrichment team. Our animal control and animal care efforts were very different. And we certainly didn't have the kind of support from volunteers, fosters, businesses, and generous individuals that we have now. We were far too limited to do all the things we wanted to do, but we kept marching along – because we cared.

What we did have, however, was a vision. We saw a day when we would be able to provide not just for animals, but for their people as well. We looked forward to not only providing top-flight veterinary care, but providing it for a fraction of the usual cost. We were determined to be a leader in animal welfare, showing shelters across the nation what was possible. We wanted to build a campus that matched the excellence of our work. We knew we could put the team in place and build an organization that would keep families together.

Now, all these years later, we're enormously proud of what we've created and we want to share it all with you. On the following pages, we're looking to give you a glimpse into what we do across our campus and give some grateful shout-outs to the extraordinary people and organizations that make it possible. This is by no means a complete picture of the incredible work that's done behind our doors; for that, you'll have to experience it for yourself. To understand what we do, you have to see our people in action – the vet techs who save lives, the volunteers to sit in a "relax room" with a scared pup, the animal control officers who rescue animals from danger, and the foster and adoption professionals who find the perfect homes for animals in need of one.

ADOPTIONS

HELPING YOU FIND A FRIEND

For all the things we do, we're known primarily as the place to find your new best friend. Wherever our staff or volunteers dare to venture – if they happen to be wearing their KHS gear – they're going to hear a story about an adoption.

"I found my first dog there. I picked him out of a litter of four. We had a moment."

"That's where we met our boy! He was so shy when we first got him, but now he just cuddles right up on your lap."

"I'm so grateful for what you do. I adopted my cat from you. She's the best thing that's ever happened to me."

Everyone has a story, and they're all wonderful. But they all start with our volunteers, Animal Welfare Advocates (AWA) and Customer Service Representatives, who make adoptions happen. Thanks to them, dozens of animals a week find new homes – the right homes. Every potential adopter is asked to fill out a survey and is screened to determine if they are a good match. Then, when they've identified an animal that they're interested in – after a leisurely stroll through our open kennels – a staff member will go over the animal's medical and behavior history with them during a pre-counsel, ascertain whether or not it's a good fit – and if so – finally introduce the pet to the people. If it's a dog, family members, including resident dogs, may meet the potential adoptee. And then we hope for magic. More often than not, it is.

All told, more than 3,100 animals were adopted into new homes in 2024 alone, and 2025 looks to be an incredible year as well.

VETERINARY SERVICES

THERE'S A DOCTOR IN THE HOUSE

Spend any amount of time around the Russ and Linda Young Veterinary Lifesaving Center (VLC) and you're bound to witness something remarkable.

On any given day – usually with a background of bouncy music – there will be a dog getting a life-saving surgery, an endless lineup of cats being readied for spays and neuters, and a sick turtle or vomiting goat. Staff and volunteers scramble from one station to the next, administering medications and vaccines, shaving surgical areas, and calming every animal who needs an extra little bit of attention.



The veterinarians, vet techs, vet assistants, operations manager, customer service representatives, and volunteers all work as one to form a well-oiled – and usually well-soiled – machine to bring animals back to health. In an area where unusual is the norm, nothing surprises anyone. A giant tumor being removed?

Just another Tuesday. A kitten's eye that needs an operation? Been there, done that. A tiny dog who needs open-heart surgery? Okay... that's one of the rare ones, but it happened. Here's the short version:

Cooper was a tiny terrier – a third the size of his littermates – who was born with a heart condition called “Patent Ductus Arteriosus” that takes the lives of 50 percent of those diagnosed with it – in the first year. Fortunately, Dr. Jen

Stonequist – KHS' Co-Executive Director – had previously performed the kind of high-risk operation that could save the little dog's life and funding was available through Sam's Fund (which you can read more about at right).

At 12:41 p.m. on a Thursday, Dr. Jen asked the sedated dog “Who are you, friend?” and began her work. In 15 minutes the pup's chest was open and the room became a master class for the other veterinarians who came to watch. Throughout the operation, Dr. Jen would urge her colleagues to look over her shoulder, explaining what she was doing like a football coach detailing a play. By 1:32 p.m., the most delicate parts of the surgery were done. Dr. Jen began to close Cooper's chest. At 1:50 the last suture was knotted and by 2:09 the pup was off to recovery.

It's all thanks to the skill and experience of a talented group of professionals who save lives as a regular occurrence. It's not always drama-filled heroics, however. There's a LOT of paperwork to do and every day ends with the team scrubbing and spraying and washing and wiping the surgical and prep areas from corner to corner. And not every day ends in victory like Cooper's did.

There are some very tough days in the VLC when

the results aren't what everyone was hoping for. It's rewarding, but physically and psychologically exhausting. But the Vet Services staff at KHS – along with their volunteer helpers – are completely committed to giving every animal a second chance at life. It's truly remarkable.

SAM'S ANGEL FUND

When people simply can't afford veterinary care for their companion animal, when all other options have been exhausted, where can they turn to? Sam, of course.

Sam's Angel Fund is named for the beloved pet of a family who donated a house to Kitsap Humane Society in 2023. The Kingston house was sold and part of the proceeds went to establish the Fund. Through this account – which is funded completely through donations – KHS is able to cover the costs of reduced-fee surgeries and other veterinary services that families may not be able to afford.

COMMUNITY RESOURCES AND BEHAVIOR

THE HELPERS

Mr. Rogers once told his audience: “When I was a boy and I would see scary things in the news, my mother would say to me, ‘Look for the helpers. You will always find people who are helping.’”

That’s the CRaB team – Community Resources and Behavior – and they’re here to help.

This squad of behavior specialists and community outreach professionals are often the first point of contact for anyone visiting Kitsap Humane Society. Working out of the Admissions Center, they manage the intake of all animals, including strays and surrenders, conduct intake exams and vaccinations, facilitate reclaims, loan equipment, and sort donations. But their duties don’t stop at the Admissions doorstep – they’re preparing our animals for life beyond the shelter and ensuring that people have the resources they need to care for their furry family members.

At a time when animal welfare organizations across the country are seeing critters that were undersocialized during the Covid lockdown, the CRaB team is working to alleviate the issue. Their work with animals includes dog and cat assessments, in-kennel enrichment, medical handling for behavior animals, coordinating shelter moves, helping with adoption counsels, and behavior training.

If that weren’t enough, they’re also responsible for managing the Pet Food Pantry program – through which families in need can get free pet food – as well as the

Barks & Rec program, which allows community members to take a dog out for an hour or day to get some valuable out-of-kennel time.

And most recently, they’ve added another facet to the diamond that is their department: a Community Resources and Outreach Coordinator. This position – created thanks to a grant from the Gary Milgard Family – provides the community with a hotline for community members to call with questions about their pets. If you need guidance or advice about rehoming a pet, strays, trap-neuter-release, or animal control, the Community Resources and Outreach Coordinator is available for person-to-person calls at 360-692-6977, ext. 1123.

It turns out Mrs. Rogers was right; you can find helpers. They’re right here.

ANIMAL CARE

KEEPING US TICKING



Like the gears behind the face of a clock, our Animal Care and Animal Welfare Associates are the pieces behind the scenes that make the whole operation run smoothly. They're up at the crack of dawn, working with volunteers to take care of all the resident animals, starting with an assessment of how things are going.

They record what each animal has eaten – or expelled – overnight and report their findings to their colleagues in Vet Services, paying particular attention to anything that might be out of the ordinary. As volunteers take each dog for their morning walk, the Techs are following behind, carefully cleaning each holding area – dog, cat, or livestock – for the first of sometimes several times a day. They ensure that each animal is fed and has the proper toys, blankets, and beds and relay any issues to their Behavior counterparts.

They're behind the scenes, but always there and attentive to the animals in their care.

It's a difficult and sometimes icky job – and there's the constant danger of being headbutted in the knees by an angry goat – but like the gears on the clock, they just keep ticking.

FOSTER CARE

OPEN HEARTS & OPEN HOMES

Kitsap Humane Society has housing for 65 dogs (plus a few side areas that can be used in a pinch), room for roughly 125 cats, a barn for livestock, and a smattering of bunny, hamster, and guinea pig kennels, bird cages, and aquariums for reptiles. Yet, last year, KHS brought in 4,171 animals and provided 84,185 total days of care. How is this possible? The math just ain't mathin'.

That's because we lean heavily on our foster families. As of the end of October 2025, KHS had 278 active foster homes and 1,060 animals who had been taken care of by them. And without the generosity of these people who open their hearts and their homes, we simply wouldn't have the capacity to do what we do.

Foster families take care of all kinds of animals in all manner of situations. If a litter of kittens needs to be syringe-fed every two hours, a pet needs a place to recover from surgery and have bandages changed regularly, or the shelter is full and a dog just needs a place to crash for a while – fosters step up to the challenge.

And the Foster office at the KHS campus is where some of the most amazing things happen. Hidden in a back hallway, stuck in the former surgical space, is where kittens are born, the tinies are warmed in incubators, and the littlest critters in our care take their first steps before being sent off to their new temporary homes. The staff and volunteers who tend to their needs are essentially their mothers for the first weeks of their young lives – feeding and bathing and keeping them safe and healthy until they're ready for the world.

ANIMAL CONTROL

IT'S A WEIRD WORLD OUT THERE

Every day at Kitsap Humane Society is something new – and some days get pretty weird. The weirdest, without question, however, usually begin with Animal Control.

Unlike most humane societies, KHS – in addition to its other duties – is responsible for animal control in the area it serves. In our case, that's everything from Gig Harbor to Bainbridge Island, including unincorporated Kitsap County – which is a lot of ground to cover for our five-officer staff. Together, the ACOs, as they're called, are on call 24/7 for animal-related emergencies that are called in through 911. And as you might imagine, the calls range from scary to sad to just plain... well, weird.

The scary ones are almost always accompanied by law enforcement and usually occur when animals are in danger – like Priscilla and her friends. Five adult cats and 16 newborn kittens, living in squalid conditions, with graffitied walls and garbage strewn from wall to wall. The kittens were malnourished and dirty and it was questionable as to whether any of them would survive. But they were rescued by ACOs, brought to KHS and all but three survived, were pampered back to health, and found new homes.

A lot of them are sad, but among the most heart-wrenching was a hoarding situation in Mason County. Sixty-seven dogs were found on the verge of starvation, living in cramped quarters, and many with their muzzles zip-tied

or duct-taped shut. ACO officers were sent to the scene to assess the health of each animal, document their condition, and send them to safety at KHS or with one of our many partners throughout the state. In time, every dog was able to recover from their ordeal and found a new – and much happier – home.

Then there's the weird. Picture the scene: a Washington State Patrol officer has pulled over a driver near Gorst at around 2 a.m. As the officer writes the driver a ticket, he looks behind him to find a 6-foot-something emu – yes, emu – standing on the freeway. Animal Control is called and a chase ensues – State Patrol, the sheriff, and a sleepy ACO, all scrambling to catch a giant flightless bird in the dead of night. Once Elliot – as he would come to be called – was wrangled into the ACO van, he was transported to KHS where he charmed visitors to our Big Animal Barn. Elliot has since been moved to a sanctuary in Jefferson County, where he'll live out his days with other emus, forever prevented from terrorizing America's highways and byways.

It's all in a day's work for KHS Animal Control. We can't wait to see what tomorrow will bring.

they ever hoped for. Aurora may have arrived at KHS with challenges, but she has turned her second chance into a life overflowing with love.



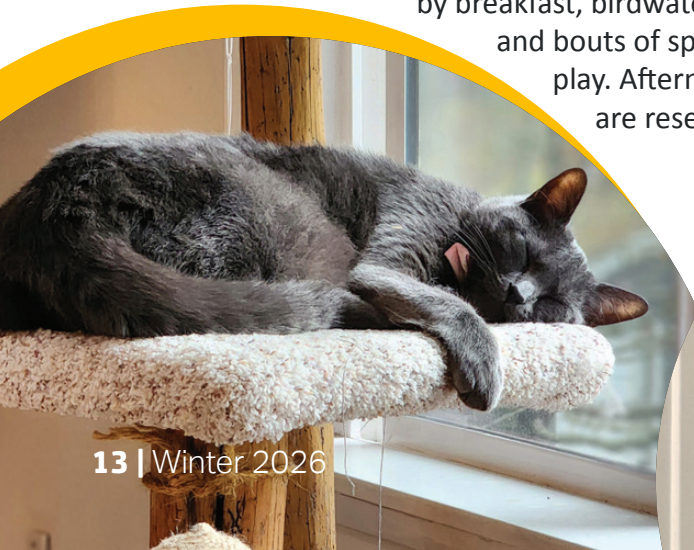
HAPPY TAILS LIO

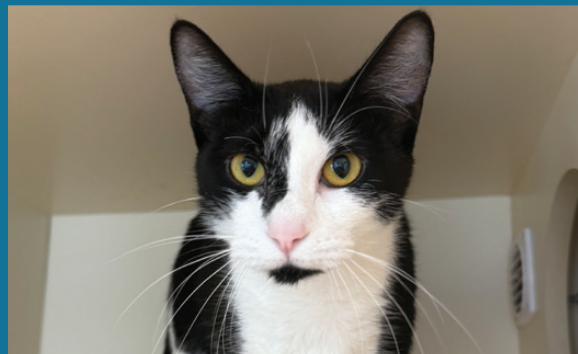
